married Mary Following an uprising against the couple Mary was imprisoned in Lochleven Castle On 24 July 1567 she was forced to abdicate in favour of James VI her one year old son by Darnley After an unsuccessful attempt to regain the throne she fled southwards seeking the protection of her first cousin once removed Queen Elizabeth I of England Mary had previously claimed Elizabeth's throne as her own and was considered the legitimate sovereign of England by many English Catholics including participants in a rebellion known as the Rising of the North Perceiving her as a threat Elizabeth had her confined in various castles and manor houses in the interior of England After eighteen and a half years in custody Mary was found guilty of plotting to assassinate Elizabeth in 1586 and was beheaded the following year The story has all the emotional savor of a crime passionnel it is adroitly worked up to a climax of violence and calamity and it subsides as skillfully to an end of tragic pity With his talent for simple exposition on a large scale his sense of drama his ready flow of emotion his inventiveness in detail of the moments of his character's life his resources of metaphor parallel and illustration and his rich psychological adornment of human life Herr Zweig has no difficulty in reducing his material into its essential drama whatever Mary's story and we shall never know Zweig's book has every right to be set down as one of the most brilliant guesses at the truth and it is an amazing piece of virtuosity to plunge her into the blackest of guilt and then restore her to our sympathy and pity Peter Munro Jack The New York Times Mr Zweig is not a historian but a litterateur practising biography as a branch of letters The distinction is not derogatory It is the clue to the strength and weakness of the book The litterateur borrows from the craft and exercises some of the liberty of the novelist He is interested in character and psychology and indulges in imaginative reconstruction more freely than the historian who is forever haunted by the words We do not know Zweig makes a real person of Mary a convincing portrait and there is sympathetic understanding even when he is presenting her as the accomplice of her lover Bothwell in the murder of Darnley Needless to say the style is remarkably easy and readable C riticism would be unjust to the brilliant qualities of Mr Zweig s book and though I hope that all he says will not be taken for gospel truth I am certain of the pleasure he will give to his readers There are many descriptive passages to be scored and many sentences that one would give a great deal to have written The whole book goes with the swing of a novel The translation is beyond praise J E Neale The Saturday Review The Chinese of America Jack Chen, 2019-08-15 Before World War I when Chinese contributed importantly to the building of America by constructing the transcontinental railroads and by digging gold and coal three fifths of them came from one small district of their homeland until 1943 immigration laws fostered their concentrations in Chinatowns only after World War II did they start integrating into American life This is the best general account of their culture contributions and problems The New York Times In this lucidly and beautifully written account of Chinese immigrants in America from the 19th century to the present Jack Chen has done a superb job of casting history into a perspective of broad understanding of nation building combined with a sense of ethnic pride William Liu University of Illinois at Chicago American Journal of Sociology Most interesting and certainly much needed John King

Hindsight: An Autobiography Charlotte Wolff,2019-08-16 Hindsight is the memoir of an outsider a stateless person a Jew and as Wolff called herself a conscious lesbian Love for women had been her inclination since she could remember and she writes that no one in her family questioned it In Hindsight she describes her girlfriends from Danzig of 1910 with the same candor as adult lovers she meets in Germany France and England She gives a vivid account of the years she spent as a physician and party girl in Weimar Berlin her friendship with Walter and Dora Benjamin and her interest in chirology the study of hands and sexology Wolff writes movingly about Jewish identity and history medicine psychotherapy and her life as a 20th century lesbian She is particularly insightful about how statelessness affects the psyche She probes her attraction to glamorous friends such as the fashion journalist Helen Hessel Kathe of Jules and Jim and Baladine Klossowska mother of the painter Balthus in Paris She describes the wartime refugee colony of Sanary France and the Quakers Surrealists Thomas and Heinrich Mann and Maria and Aldous Huxley whom she met there When she moves to London in 1936 her medical degree is not recognized and she reads hands for a living including the hands of Virginia Woolf Sybille Bedford and the Duchess of Windsor before becoming a researcher at University College London Though reluctant to become what she called a professional lesbian Wolff began to join same sex political groups in the 1960s after researching her book Love Between Women published in 1971 Germans invited her to Germany and she ends her book with a detailed account of her triumphant
