Peripheral Transmodernities Ignacio López-Calvo, 2012-01-24 This volume is a collection of essays dealing with the critical dialogue between the cultural production of the Hispanic Latino world and that of the so called Orient or the Orient itself including the Asian and Arab worlds As we see in these essays the Europeans cultural others peripheral nations and former colonies have established an intercultural and intercontinental dialogue among themselves without feeling the need to resort to the center metropolis mediation These South to South dialogues tend not to be as asymmetric as the old dialogue between the former metropolis the hegemonic Eurocentric center and the colonies These essays about Hispanic and Latino cultural production most of them dealing with literature but some covering urban art music and film provide vivid examples of de colonizing impetus and cultural resistance.
